2026-27: Create Lasting Impact

Welcome everyone to tonight's Vocational awards night.

Peter Webb will formally introduce the 4 winners and a short report on them.

- **Perc Moore Award for Horticulture at Holmesglen TAFE**
- Named in honour of Perc Moore, a dedicated past member of the Rotary Club of Oakleigh.
- **Horticultural Impact:** Perc Moore is celebrated historically as a foundational figure who helped establish formal, structured **horticultural training systems in Victoria**.
- **Longevity:** This is one of the club's longest-running vocational traditions. For instance, the 44th annual award milestone was reached back in 2020.
- **Target Group:** Presented annually to the most **Outstanding First-Year Horticulture Apprentice**.
- **Partner Institution:** Administered in partnership with [Holmesglen TAFE](#).
- Awarded to an individual exhibiting technical mastery, career dedication, and high academic performance in turf management, landscaping, or general horticulture.
- **Len and Edna Hawke Award for Paediatric Nursing at Monash Children's Hospital**
- The award honours the late **Len Hawke**—a highly dedicated Rotarian, Paul Harris Fellow (PHF), and recipient of the Order of Australia Medal (OAM)—and his late wife, **Edna Hawke**.
- **The Mission:** It was established to honour the couple's lifelong philanthropic devotion to assisting and improving the lives of vulnerable children.
- **The Criteria:** It is presented to an exceptional staff nurse at [Monash Children's Hospital](#) who demonstrates profound clinical skill, empathy, and vocational commitment to paediatric care.
- **Allen James Award in the disability field at OC Connections**
- Named in honour of the late **Allen James**, who was both a founding member of the Oakleigh Center (now known as [OC Connections](#)) and the charter secretary of the original Rotary Club of Oakleigh.
- **The Criteria:** The coveted award is given each year to a standout staff member from OC Connections who demonstrates exceptional commitment, grace, and skill in enriching the lives of people living with disabilities.
- **The Reward:** It functions as a **vocational scholarship**, providing financial support to help the recipient pursue further formal education, qualifications, and specialized training directly within the disability and inclusion field.
- **Bill Norling Award for Heavy Vehicle Apprentice at Chisholm TAFE**
- Named in memory of William (Bill) Norling, a highly gifted engineer, pioneer in Australian road transport, and owner of *W&H Norling Engineering* in Clayton.
- **Rotary & Civic Service:** Bill was a prominent member of the local Rotary Club for nearly 30 years and served on the local Oakleigh Council alongside his wife, Heather. Following his passing in March 2000, he was inducted into the [National Road Transport Hall of Fame](#).
- The accolade was established to honour his immense role in the early development of heavy vehicle engineering and his dedicated service to the community.

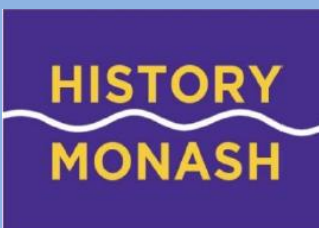

Invitation to nominate for the role of DGN (DG 2028-29) for the new Rotary District 9825 (9815 and 9830)

As many of you will be aware, Districts 9815 and 9830 will come together to form the new Rotary District 9825 from 1 July 2028.

This is an exciting and significant opportunity for Rotary in our region. Bringing together clubs and members across Tasmania, Melbourne's east and eastern Victoria will create new opportunities for collaboration, leadership, friendship and greater community impact.

Nominations are now open

We are pleased to invite nominations for the position of:

District Governor Nominee (DGN) District 9825 – District Governor 2028–2029

The successful candidate will play an important role in shaping the future of our new district and helping guide Rotary through this significant period of transition.

Please refer to the attached **Call for Nominations** document, which provides further information about the position, including the proposed duties, responsibilities and qualifications.

The successful candidate will initially become part of the **District 9825 Transition Management Team**, working with Rotarians from both districts to progressively plan and manage the successful transition to our new district structure. The successful candidate will subsequently join the District 9825 Board from **1 July 2027**, in preparation for taking on the role of District Governor for 2028–2029.

A new approach to district leadership

The District Governor role within District 9825 will be supported by a strong District Board and leadership team comprising skilled, experienced and dedicated Rotarians and Rotaractors who will work closely with clubs across the new district. Changes to the District Governor role are also being explored as part of the **Zone 8 Regionalisation Pilot**. The pilot is currently scheduled to conclude in June 2028, after which its outcomes will be reviewed and further decisions made regarding the future structure and responsibilities of district leadership.

Consequently, candidates should be aware that the responsibilities of the District Governor for 2028–2029 are expected to be different from the current District Governor role as defined under Article 16.030 of the Rotary International Bylaws.

An opportunity to shape our future

This is much more than an opportunity to take on a district leadership position. It is an opportunity to help **shape the culture, direction and future of a brand-new Rotary district**.

The person appointed will have the opportunity to bring people together, encourage new ideas, strengthen relationships between clubs and help establish a leadership model that reflects the changing needs of Rotary and our communities. We encourage Rotarians who are passionate about Rotary, enjoy working with people, embrace new ideas and believe in the potential of our new district to consider putting themselves forward. The successful DGN will also be required to attend **Governor Nominee Leadership Training in Melbourne during the last week of October 2026**.

Future leadership opportunities

We also recognise that the creation of District 9825 will provide a range of new leadership opportunities for Rotarians who may not yet be ready to put themselves forward for District Governor.

Under normal circumstances, we would expect to consider the appointment of a **District Governor Nominee Designate in February 2027**. If you have an interest in contributing to district leadership during this period, we warmly encourage you to consider expressing your interest.

In addition, the introduction of **three Deputy District Governor roles** is currently under consideration. These positions are intended to provide strong representation and support for the District Governor across our three geographic areas and create additional leadership pathways within the new district.

These appointments would be made in consultation with the incoming District Governor Nominee, providing an opportunity to build a strong and diverse leadership team for District 9825.

Volunteer Youth Forms

"All members - following up on working with children checks – it is imperative that all members who may come in contact – even incidental - with children (those under 18) have a working with children's card (WWC) – most members have one but for those that do not could you apply for one ASAP and advise Michael once its received. It costs nothing to apply for a card as a volunteer – you can apply using this link [Working with Children Check \(service.vic.gov.au\)](http://Working with Children Check (service.vic.gov.au))

Now for the additional requirement of a Form 3 – as explained by the District Youth Chair – Ken Mirams – this is an additional requirement imposed by both the Victorian Government, Rotary International and for insurance purposes. The Form 3 is an extra check particularly for those situations where you may at any time be in a one-on-one situation with a child (anyone under 18), in those cases you must have both the WWC card and a completed Form 3.

Trust that this clarifies – incidental contact with children (not one on one) a WWC check is sufficient – in situations where you will or may be one on one then a Form 3 must be completed. Of course, logistically it makes planning a lot easier if we all have both the WWC card and a Form 3"

A safe transition beyond the wire

A Rotary club in Kansas helps women break the cycle of incarceration and elude dangers on the outside

Up until a few years ago, Jodi Whitt's trips to the Shawnee County jail in Topeka, Kansas, began with an arrest and an anxious wait in a bare intake cell for up to 72 hours. Her incarcerations lasted 30 days or so, until an abrupt release without resources or support — nothing but the clothes on her back. She'd fall back into her addiction, return to the jail, repeat the cycle. "I spent years in and out of the jail — it wasn't like I had one stay here," she says. "I had a revolving door of incarceration for over 20 years."

Things began to change in 2019. She got sober, committed to treatment, and pushed herself to try new things, like enrolling in a University of Kansas technology education program designed for formerly incarcerated women. A few years later, she made a decision that would change her life — and the lives of so many other women. "I wanted to go back into the jail and help the women, because that's where I needed the help," she says. "That's where I needed the intervention."



The Shawnee County jail is home to Intersection to Care, a reentry program created by the Rotary Club of Community Action Against Human Trafficking.

Little did Whitt know where that sentiment would lead her. A local Rotary club formed in 2021 to combat human trafficking, and its members asked her to join their mentorship program to help women transition to life outside of jail. As Whitt's involvement grew, the club established itself as a key reentry service provider in Shawnee County, fundamentally interrupting the cycle of incarceration for many women there.

Now, most mornings Jodi Whitt starts her day by doing her hair and makeup, feeding her cat, and then driving to the jail, where her desk is decorated with affirmational quotes, a ceramic white unicorn, and a small, blue-fringed Magic of Rotary banner. Surrounded by office supplies and resource handbooks waiting to be delivered, she opens her laptop and begins a new day — not as an incarcerated woman but as someone who helps and supports them.

Perched on a swivel chair, Whitt takes it all in from the comfort of her cozy office. "Sometimes I don't believe it's true," she says. "Sometimes I can't believe this is my life now."

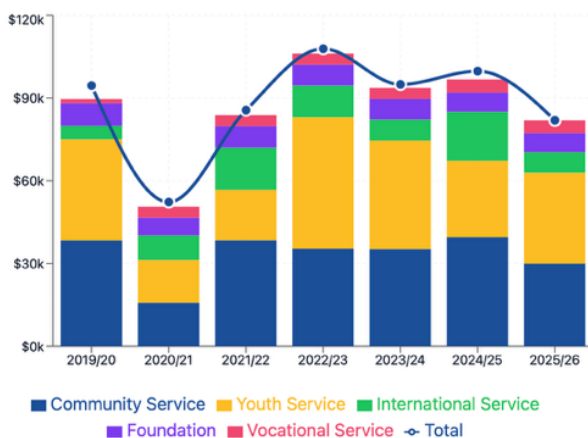

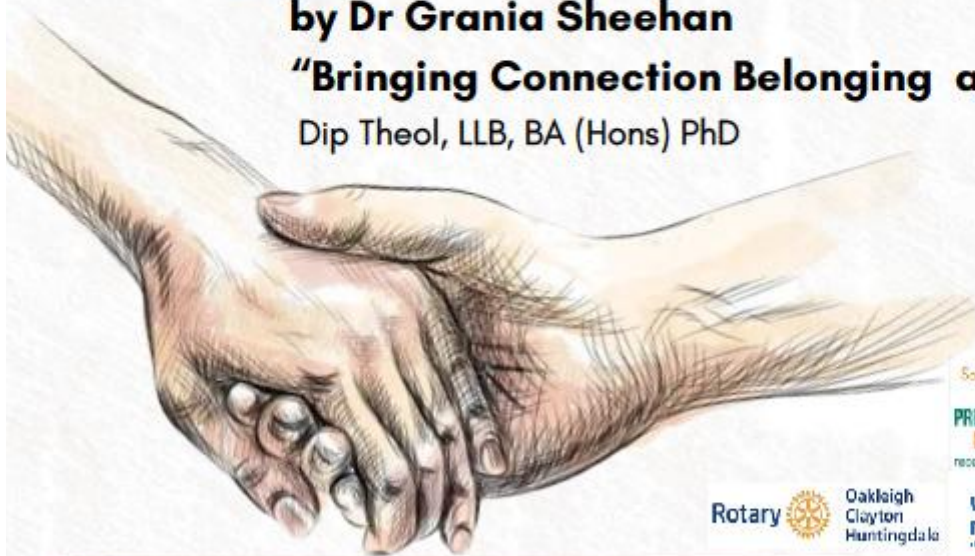
